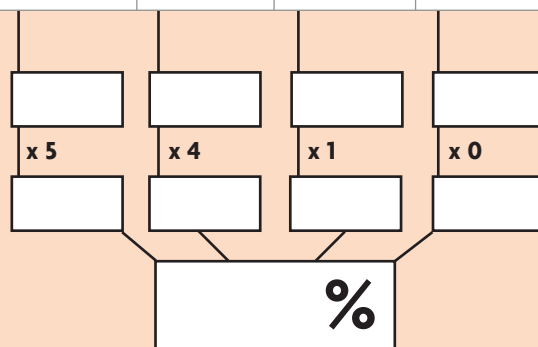

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GET INFORMED: SELF-ASSESSMENT CHECKLIST

Note	Comment	Reference
1	Employers are required to ensure that all FLT operators are trained.	PUWER 98 (Reg 9)
2	The certificate provided by the trainer should show what trucks the employee is qualified to operate. Different trucks require different skills.	L117 (Para 67)
3	It should not be possible for an unauthorised person to operate an FLT.	L117 (Para 136)
4	HSE recommend regular monitoring and assessment of operators.	L117 (Para 75-76)
5	If you introduce new or different equipment or change your methods of work you may need to think about additional training for your operators,	L117 (Paras 44)
6	The condition of a lift truck will deteriorate over time. In the interests of safety the truck should be checked before each day or shift it is used.	L117 (Paras 162)
7	Once faults occur those components, and other associated components can deteriorate quickly. In the interests of safety, and economy, repair should not be delayed.	
8	Such preventive maintenance is the best way to keep equipment operating in a safe and productive manner. (Unscheduled work can be expensive.)	PUWER 98 (Reg 5)
9	This is a legal requirement.	LOLER 98 (Reg 9)
10	This is not a legal requirement but it helps to keep everyone informed. See also www.thoroughexamination.org	CFTS
11	Improvised or inappropriate use of equipment is never a good idea. Employers are required to use the right equipment for the job.	PUWER 98 (Reg 4)
12	This is one of the best ways of keeping everyone safe.	L117 (Paras 121)
13	This is another really good way of keeping everyone safe.	L117 (Paras 121)
14	Good housekeeping should be instilled in everyone. As soon as something is spilt, knocked over or dropped it should be cleared up in an appropriate manner.	
15	Everyone has a right to feel safe in their place of work.	
16	It is important that a person who supervises FLT operations can spot bad practice and do something about it. For a small company this may be the boss.	L117 (Para 84-85)
17	It is important to determine that these checks are being carried out and to take action when they are not, or to ensure that faults found are rectified.	
18	This is a normal function of management and supervision. However, with lifting operations these responsibilities are more important.	
19	Tasks should not be taken for granted. The conduct of routine tasks should be checked periodically. More complex tasks may require a risk assessment and plan every time.	LOLER 98 (Reg 8)
20	This is just another example of simple good practice. Taking account of employees' suggestions can help safety and productivity.	
21	As well as adding up the columns look under and beside each main heading to see if there is one group that is further right than you would like. It may point to an area where extra work is needed.	
22	Check the references against any questions where you have not scored "always".	
23	You probably need help to raise your standards.	
24	You should acquire and read L117, as well as the FLTA Employee Safety Book.	
25	The situation is serious. If you score is genuine then you need to seek professional advice as soon as possible. You can find your closest FLTA member by putting your postcode into the Member Finder on our website at www.fork-truck.org
